



## We get people working

Finding work is key to the financial stability required to afford housing in Hawaii, one of the nation's most expensive places to live. At IHS, The Institute for Human Services, we help people who are homeless or on the verge of it to get workforce ready with these services: free business attire, resume writing, interview skills, ESL courses, transportation help, budgeting courses, and skill development. Job coaches also provide ongoing support for clients as they transition to a new job, which helps sustain employment.

## Vocational Training

People get hands-on experience with the Taking Root Urban Agriculture Program in which IHS clients learn aquaponic and hydroponic farming. The produce is sold at local groceries including Down to Earth and Kokua Market. Classes are held a few times a week for people who are homeless or at risk.

New Leaf Cleaning & Landscaping trains and employs those who are homeless and seeking work in janitorial services and housekeeping.
